Horbury and District Allotments and Gardens Association 100th Show

I do hope you will join us at our 100th Show. You're either reading this as you've picked up a schedule with the intention of entering produce or handicrafts or you're thinking of having a look at what goes on at the Show and perhaps wondering whether your growing is up to the entry standard. All I can say is don't be shy, don't be put off, there is room for everyone.

We've been established as an Association since 1929, so that particular centenary is three years away. However, this will be our 100th Show because some years (war years) we didn't have one and then some other years, we had two.

The Horbury and District Gardens & Allotments Association is quite important to us; we currently have close to 200 members most of whom are from the Wakefield or Kirklees areas; the manufacturing, heavy woollen and mining communities of old.

In the past we'd have 70/80 entrants and perhaps 500/600 exhibits and there were definite characters who were "showing types" such as Derek, the Dahlia Guy, who placed umbrellas over his flower heads to keep the rain off!

In days gone by, we'd take a stand at Wakefield Flower Show and then Manchester and finally the northern pinnacle, the Southport Show.

In earlier years growers would start off by mixing their own compost, nothing came in bags apart from sacks of peat. The format for the Show was much the same as today but a broader range, for example eggs, with both brown and white show categories. We included flower arrangements for a time and home made wines.

In the past, we've held shows in the Methodist Hall, the High School and, in recent times, at Horbury WMC, where we have the Show on the Saturday and the Harvest Festival and auction on the Sunday. This also features a performance from Horbury Victoria Band. Our partnership with the Club and Band started over 30 years ago and it plays a big part in making the weekend a success.

There's no getting away from the fact that shows of old were bigger affairs. Lots of folk were growing flowers and veg to feed the family but growing for showing was a different thing altogether and in many respects, for the serious grower, it still is. But we also want to make room for the gardener who grows for pleasure and for food but who might also grow some great specimens, either by accident or design.....and we don't care. As long as you enter our Show in the right spirit you're most welcome.

The Horbury, Ossett and District Chrysanthemum Society has been established since 1945. It was formed after a meeting of interested parties in the Fleece public house in Horbury. The Society includes growers of Dahlias and welcomes any other enthusiastic plant growers.

The Society is affiliated with the National Chrysanthemum Society, Royal Horticultural Society and the National Chrysanthemum Society (Northern Group). It is a registered charity. We have a close association with the Horbury and District Allotments and Gardens Association and many of our members and position holders serve both societies.

Up until 2019 we held four shows a year. Two which were held in the Quarry Public House and two which were held in the Ossett Community Centre. A late Show was also shared with the Doncaster Society up until 2022.

Top Tray Class

The Association Top Tray is for a display of three vegetables chosen from the following eight. The quantity of each vegetable is shown in brackets:

CARROTS (3)	CAULIFLOWER (2)	ONIONS (3)	TOMATOES (6)
PARSNIPS (2)	PEAS (6 Pods)	POTATOES (3)	RUNNER BEANS (6 Pods)

For carrots and parsnips, the top foliage should be trimmed to not more than 3 inches from the top of the shoulder of the vegetable.

The Vegetables should be displayed within an area of 46cm (18") by 61cm (24"). All vegetables must be displayed within the confines of this area, and no part of any vegetable may come out of it.

A tray or board measuring 46cm (18") by 61cm (24") can be used on which to display the vegetables, or the area can simply be marked out on the staging. Where a tray has a lip or edge it is the internal measurement that must be no greater than 46cm (18") by 61cm (24").

A black base cloth is permitted, or the tray can be painted. The only garnishing material allowed is parsley. No other material is allowed at all (no plates, sand, onion rings etc.)

An Association that continues to flourish

Under the ownership of the Horbury Common Lands Trust, Horbury & District Allotments & Gardens Association continues to flourish. Established in 1929, as its name suggests, it has the oversight of eight plots on Southwell Lane but caters for the gardening and growing needs of a much wider populace.

By means of the Trading Hut in Horbury, a strong and dynamic committee has traditionally sought to provide the necessary supplies for good vegetable- and flower-growing conditions.

In the past, lime, soot and manure were the key commodities for good allotment crops. Now peat-free compost, chemical fertilisers,

canes, netting, pest-control products, seeds, onion sets, shallots and seed potatoes are all sold at very competitive rates to the nearly 200 members of the Association. For a £5.00 subscription per annum – or £3.00 for juniors and members over 65 – the cost of membership has risen little over decades.

Over the years there have been a number of significant changes. In the past tending an allotment was traditionally a working man's preserve. Often having to start work at 6am and not finish till evening, working men took on an allotment that provided not



only necessary food for the table but welcome relief from the daily drudgery of work in mill or mine. Nowadays the participation of women tending and enjoying allotments and gardens has increased dramatically. Almost a third of the membership of the Association are women. Furthermore, many of the members are retired. So, what was once almost exclusively a working man's pastime until recent times now encompasses a far wider spectrum of society, male and female, as reflected not only in the membership of the Association but also in the composition of the Association's present committee.

Undoubtedly one of the highlights of the Association's year since its inception has been the Annual Show.

The Show has traditionally taken place in the first week of September at the Horbury Working Members' Club on Cluntergate, Horbury. Exhibitors bring their produce from 9am to 12.15pm on the Saturday of the Show. Judging takes place from 1pm and the doors open to the public at 4pm.

The Prize Presentation takes place soon after. The vast array of cups and trophies to be won bears witness to the enthusiasm of many appreciative members over the Association's long history.



The day after the Show we have been fortunate to enjoy a performance given by the Horbury Victoria Brass Band. This is followed by an auction for charity of the previous day's exhibits. An entertaining afternoon for everyone.

There is one other element that deserves a mention. The use of modern technology has brought about a number of changes. Much of the complicated Entry administration for the Show is conducted by computer; much of the communication with members and the committee is by email. Increasingly, use is made of cashless transactions at the Trading Hut and online bank transfers. There is no doubt, along with the website (www.horburyallotments.co.uk) that technology has transformed the way the Association is run and contributed greatly to its daily organisation.

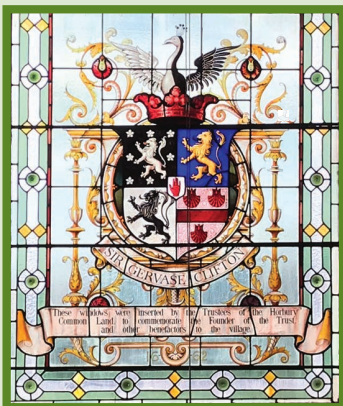
If technology has helped with administration, it has also helped to publicise the Association's activities. But there is one innovation that has paid no heed to such an aid. At the bottom of Queen Street in Horbury is a telephone box (now obsolete). Now termed 'The Red Box Gallery', it houses artistic displays for a number of charitable organisations. Horbury Allotment Association have begun to

make full use of this facility, and each August shoppers in Horbury have the opportunity to enjoy an eye-catching visual display to advertise the Show. It is a highly original and unique addition to the Horbury scene.

Long may the Show – and the Association – continue to thrive, hopefully for the next one hundred years.

Horbury Common Lands Trust

Horbury Common Lands Trust was founded in 1653 by Sir Gervase Clifton, Lord of the Manor of Wakefield to administer rents generated from the letting of the town's common land. The rents had to be used to benefit the Minister of the church and the poor of the town. The remaining monies were to be used as thought fit, such as repairing water banks, bridges and highways within the town.

In more recent times, Horbury Common Lands Trust has been underwriting a myriad of organisations within Horbury. Many groups have benefited, including Horbury Victoria Band, Horbury Bridge Scouts, The Cluntergate Centre, Slazengers Bowling Team, Friends of Green Park, Horbury Town FC, Horbury Methodist Church, Horbury Street Fayre, Primrose Hall, St Mary's Church, Horbury Show, St Peter's Church, Friends of Horbury Parks, Horbury Churches Together and to individuals who require contributions to fund extraordinary achievements. Grants to qualifying senior citizens are made each Christmas.

Applications for grants are invited from individuals or not-for-profit groups who are resident within the parish of Horbury, involving work directly linked to the benefit of Horbury and its citizens.

The Trust meet in March, June, September and December. Please be sure to submit your application by the 1st day of the month of the meeting, to be considered that month.

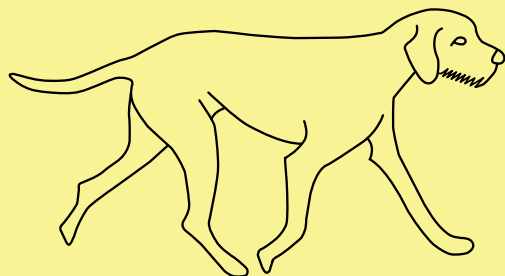

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RULES

1. No exhibitor shall be allowed more than one prize for the same description of article in any one class and shall stage neither more nor less articles than the schedule specifies. The committee shall have power to enquire whether items exhibited in all classes are the bona fide work of the exhibitor and if not, such exhibitor shall forfeit their entrance money, lose claim on the Association, and be excluded from membership thereof.
2. All exhibits at this show shall be bona fide work of the exhibitor and not a collection from several sources. If it is proved that an exhibit is not the bona fide work of the exhibitor, s/he shall forfeit their entrance money and prize money and shall be excluded from exhibiting at any future show of the Association. The committee shall have power to visit the garden of any exhibitor either before or after the show.
3. The judges shall have the power to withhold, at their discretion, prizes for inferior articles or where there are insufficient entries.
4. Strict attention must be paid to the number and quality of each article marked in the schedule. Any exhibitor staging more or less will be disqualified in such classes.
5. Entries must be received by 12.15pm and staging completed by 12.30pm. Judging will commence at 1.00pm.
6. Any objection other than on the merit of the awards made by the judges, after the judge's decision is known, shall be made in writing accompanied by a deposit of £5, and handed to the secretary not later than 4.30pm on the day of the Show. If the objection is sustained, the deposit will be refunded; otherwise, it will be forfeited.
7. All disputes in connection with the show are to be referred to the committee and their decision shall be final. No legal proceedings to be taken.
8. Prize money will be paid on the day of the show from 4.30pm-5.30pm.
9. In the event of a tie-on points, any trophy will be awarded to the exhibitor with the highest number of first prize awards.
10. The show will close at 5.30pm and remaining exhibits will be auctioned at the Harvest Festival the following afternoon in Horbury WMC Ltd.
11. Junior classes: It is preferable that name or initials (and in the case of entries submitted via school, school name and class name) should be on a removable label so that judging cannot be prejudiced.

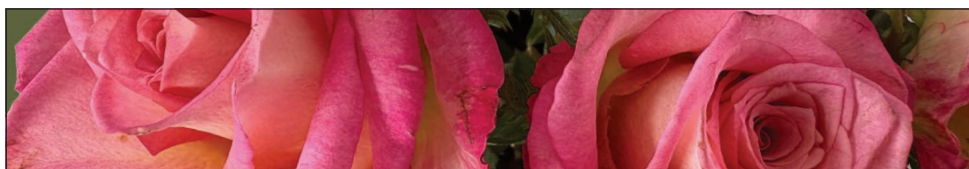
